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Annual Reporting

- Council accepted the report *Responding to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action: Principles for a Collaborative Pathway Forward in Wood Buffalo* as information in 2021.
- Council directed Administration to provide an annual update on the status of the municipal response to Truth and Reconciliation in Wood Buffalo with an additional report provided every four years to coincide with the Council term.
- IRR continues to create initiatives to advance reconciliation within the region and annual reports are provided to highlight these efforts.






Overview

- The Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) of Canada defines reconciliation as establishing and maintaining mutually respectful relationships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people.
- Between 2008 2015, the TRC travelled to communities across Canada to hear from more than 6500 of survivors about the impacts of residential schools.
- The TRC hosted 7 national events across Canada to engage the Canadian public, educate people about the history and legacy of residential schools, and share and honour the experiences of former students and their families.
- In December 2015, the TRC released their entire 6-volume Final Report -*Honouring the Truth, Reconciling for the Future,* which also issued the 94 Calls to Action.

The Path Forward

- Emphasizing renewed or established Treaty relationships
- Action with United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples
- Build upon partnership with Wood Buffalo Regional Library
- Provide newcomers with information that reflects the history of local Indigenous Peoples





Recommendation to Council

- 1.THAT the attached report *Responding to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action in Fort McMurray Wood Buffalo – 2023 Annual Update* be accepted as information.
- 2.THAT Call to Action 45 be formally adopted, which calls upon the Government of Canada, on behalf of all Canadians, to jointly develop with Aboriginal peoples a Royal Proclamation of Reconciliation to be issued by the Crown.
- 3.THAT Call to Action 69 (recommended by Alberta Municipalities) be formally adopted, which encourages libraries to commit more resources to public education and programming focused on residential schools.
- 4.THAT Call to Action 93 (recommended by Alberta Municipalities) be formally adopted, which calls on governments to create and/or revise information kits for newcomers to reflect a more inclusive history of the diverse Aboriginal peoples of Canada, including information about the Treaties and the history of residential schools.
